Speaker preview

TIM LESHCHYSHYN FRACKNOWLEDGE (CANADA)

Tim has a chemical engineering degree from the University of Alberta with 18 years experience in the industry. Tim is currently the principal of

Fracturing Horizontal Well Completions Inc and leads a group of 12 consultants with a client base that includes Alberta Innovates Technology Futures / Alberta Research Council, Pemex in Mexico, Cuadrilla in England, Delcuadra in Hungary, Tamboran in

Ireland and many Canadian well operators.

Tim has released the largest production tied fracturing, completions and drilling database for Canada, including scanned well files and various reports.

In the past, Tim has worked for both exploration and production and service companies including the building of Century Frac Services from scratch, Canadian Natural Resources, BJ Services, Fracmaster, Petro Canada and Mobil Oil. He is a member of the Association

of Professional Engineers, Geologists, and Geophysicists Alberta, Society of Petroleum Engineers board of directors and the Canadian Society for Unconventional Resources subcommittee chair.

Within these roles Tim helps organise conferences, courses and technical events. Experience includes teaching courses and leading groups of consultants or client engineers to optimise fractures using petrophysics/geomechanics.



PROFESSOR ERIC MAY UNIVERSITY OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Eric has conducted experimental research in oil and gas engineering for over a decade, and his prize-winning PhD research

on gas condensate phase behaviour resulted in an international patent.

Following his PhD, Eric was an American Australian Association Fellow

at the National Institute of Standards and Technology in Maryland, United States, where he worked in the Process Measurements Division and was a co-recipient of the 2005 Technical Achievement Award for the development of next generation standards for gas metrology.

In September 2009, Eric was appointed the inaugural Chevron Chair in Gas

Process Engineering and, in 2010 he was named the Western Australian Early Career Scientist of the Year. In 2011 Chevron endowed the Gas Process Engineering Chair occupied by Eric, making it only the fifth Professorial Chair at the University of Western Australia that is funded in perpetuity.



BARRY RHEINHART OWNER AND PRESIDENT SAGE ENERGY (CANADA)

Barry Rinehart is the President and a co-owner of Sage Energy Corp. Sage Energy specialise in the fabrication

of customised natural gas and power

generation equipment. Barry has been involved in the gas compression industry for nearly 30 years. His experience ranges from complex equipment design and construction and hands on shop and field troubleshooting to sales and marketing management roles.

Barry is a member of the Calgary chapter of The Executive Committee, he is also a partner with Social Venture Partners Calgary and in 2007 Barry was a finalist in the Ernst and Young Entrepreneur of the Year Awards. Barry and his wife have three sons.

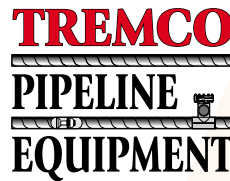

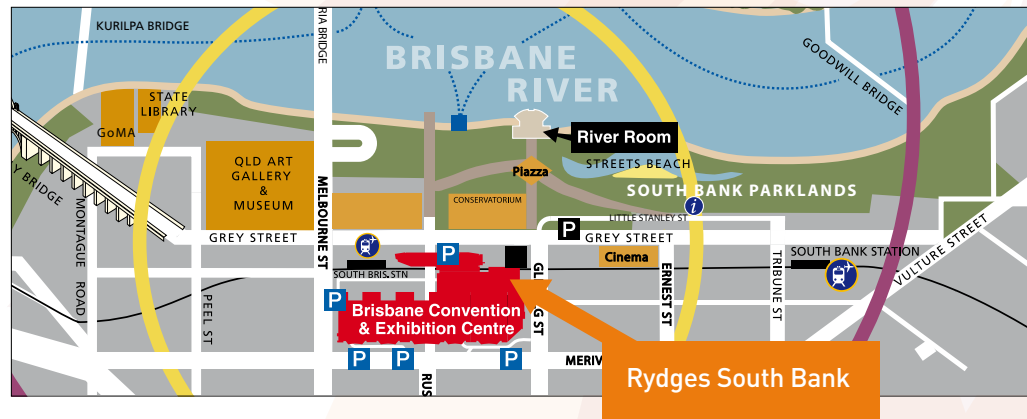
